to go through three three Resolutions that
have been very important for us.
And all of you did receive a copy in your
packet; if you'd like to, of course, read along
with me or observe the Resolutions.
The first is Resolution 2020 number 19.
And it's a Resolution Approving the 2020-
'21 Budget for the Union City Housing Authority.
And Whereas, the Annual Budget and Capital

Budget Program for the Union City Housing 1 Authority for the fiscal year July 1, 2020 and 2 3 ending in June 30, 2021 has been presented before 4 the governing body of the Authority at its open 5 public meeting held on May 21st, 2020. And you do have a copy of that in -- in 6 7 your -- in your packet. COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: 8 Right. 9 MS. JETTER: Right. 10 MR. SANGER: Whereas, the Annual Budget and Capital Budget Program was -- as presented for 11 adoption reflects each item of revenue and 12 appropriation in the same amount and title as set 13 forth in the introduced and approved budget 14 including all amendments thereto which has been 15 16 approved by the Director of the Division of Local 17 Government Services; and 18 Whereas, the Annual Budget is presented for 19 adoption reflects Total Revenues of 13,487,731, 20 Total Appropriations including a Accumulated Deficit of 13,292,201 and Total Unrestricted Net 21 22 Position Utilization of zero; and 23 Whereas, the Capital Budget as presented for adoption reflects Total Appropriations of 24

1,150,000 and Total Unrestricted Net Position to

be utilized of -- at zero; and

Whereas, the schedule of rents, fees and other charges in effect will produce sufficient revenues, together with all anticipated revenues to satisfy all obligations to the holders of bonds of the Authority, to meeting — to meet operating expenses, capital outlays, debt service requirements and provide for such resources, all as may be required by law, regulation in terms of contract and agreement; and

Whereas, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:31-2, the
Capital Budget/Program does not confer to any
authorization to raise or expend funds; rather it
is a document to be used as a part of the
Authority's planning and management objectives.
Specific authorization to expend funds for the
purposes described in this section of the budget,
must be granted elsewhere, by bond resolution, by
a project financing agreement, by resolution
appropriating funds from the Renewal and
Replacement Reserve or any other means provided
by law; and

Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the governing body of the Authority, at its open public meeting held on May 21, 2020 that the Annual Budget and

Capital Budget/Program of the Authority, 1 including all related schedules, for the fiscal 2 3 year beginning July 1, 2020 and ending July (sic) 30, 2021 is hereby adopted and shall constitute appropriations for the purposes stated; and 5 6 Be It Further Resolved, that the 7 anticipated revenues as reflected in the Annual Budget are of sufficient amount to meet all proposed expenditures/expenses and all covenants, 10 terms, provisions as stipulated in the 11 Authority's outstanding debt obligations, capital lease arrangements and service contracts and 12 13 other pledged agreements; and 14 Be It Further Resolved, that the governing

body of the Authority will consider the Annual Budget and Capital -- for the adoption on July 16th, 2020.

Community Affairs, as part of the Ordinance that requires us to do so. But the budget is -- is 2 3 very helpful in the -- in planning and looking at 4 what we anticipate for the upcoming fiscal year. 5 To look at -- if you'd like we can turn to F-1 in the exhibit under Summary. 6 7 You'll see that there is a proposed surplus of 195,530. That's the difference between what 8 we're going to receive in revenues versus 9 appropriations -- what we're going to spend. 10 11 That difference is basically 195,530, as I said, it is down slightly from last year's 12 13 proposed budget of 378,231. 14 As I said before, this is just a budget --15 MS. DILLON: I'm sorry. 16 Jorge? 17 MR. RODRIGUEZ: -- (indiscernible) --18 concrete number here that we basically are going to stick with. 19 Because, as you know, there's so many 20 21 unanticipated things that happen throughout the 22 year, just as we are experiencing right now with the pandemic. Sometimes expenses and things come 23

So, in summary, basically the biggest

up that we didn't look forward to.

appropriation that we are experiencing again is
our fringe benefits and our post-employment
benefits. Those are the basic cost drivers in
this budget as has been in previous budgets, so
there's no change there.

But, other than that, we are again projecting a surplus and the -- the overall picture, for the finance picture for the Authority looks very positive.

If there's any further questions, if you want me to move on with any other schedule here, I would gladly address it right now or in the future.

But, again, this is a budget and we are complying with the Ordinance to the State and delivering this to the State.

And then once the State approves it, we will reconvene and in July, as the Director stated earlier, we will then vote again on the adoption of the budget.

SANGER: Okay. 6 Thank you. 7 We'll move on now to Resolution 2020 number 20. 8 9 Resolution Approving Publication of Bid for Replacement and Repair of Hot Water Heater and 10 Boilers at AMP I and AMP II of the Union City 11 Housing Authority. 12 13 Whereas, the Union City Housing Authority is seeking to repair and replace the existing hot 14 water heater and boilers at AMP I and II; and 15 16 Whereas, the Authority is required to 17 publish an RPF inviting contractors to bid on the 18 requested services; Whereas, the Executive Director is seeking 19 20 approval of the Commissioners of the Union City 21 Housing Authority to submit and publish an RFP for hot water heater and boiler repair and 22 replacement services for AMP I and AMP II; 23 24 Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Commissioners of the Union City Housing Authority 25

1 do hereby approve the publication inviting contractors to bid on hot water heater and boiler 2 replacement for repairs for AMP I and AMP II in 3 order to get a legally responsible submission. 4 5 And before I do go on, some of you may be asking what is AMP I or AMP II. 6 7 AMP I is our downtown site at Columbia Court. And that's -- AMP -- AMP stands -- is for 8 Assessment Management Project. And it's just a 9 term that's used by HUD -- a financial term. So 10 that's -- AMP I is downtown; it's a financial 11 acronym I would say. 12 13 And then down-- that is downtown; AMP I. And 39^{th} Street here, at 640 and 634, is --14 15 is AMP II -- is AMP II. 16 Okay? 17 So that is that. And -- and moving on with our Resolution --18 just a little clarification there. 19 20 Be It Further Resolved the Executive Director, Union City Housing Authority is hereby 21 authorized to publish a bid for hot water heater 22 23

and boiler repair and replacement services for AMP I, AMP II of the Union City Housing Authority.

1 This is two vitally needed big boilers for 2 downtown and for 39th Street here, which is going to continue, of course, during our heat -- so 3 important for our heating season for all of our -- for all of our residents. 5 6 And the last Resolution is 2020-21. Approving Contract for Afterhours Tele--7 8 Telephone Answering Service. 9 And Whereas, the Union City Housing 10 Authority sought bids for afterhours telephone 11 service. 12 Two bids were picked up and one bid was 13 submitted to the Authority on the date of the

opening.

And the bid submitted by Academy Group was determined to be the -- the lowest responsible bidder and determined to be legally sufficient; and

Whereas, the contract shall be paid in accordance with the rate set forth in the proposal submitted to the Authority for a two year contract, not to exceed a flat rate of \$372.00 for 13 -- 13 billings a year; and

Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Commissioners of the Union City Housing Authority do hereby approve of a contract with Academy

Group to provide afterhours telephone answering

service in accordance with the bid

specifications; and

Resolved that the contract shall be paid in accordance with the bid submitted not to exceed \$372.00 flat rate for 13 billings a year for two years, which is 4,836, which shall also not exceed the cap for services which is 7,310;

Be It Further Resolved that the Executive Director of the Union City Housing Authority is hereby authorized to execute contract to the Academy Group, for afterhours telephone answering service consistent with this bid submission.

Those are our three Resolutions.

This last Resolution, I just want to clarify, for the answering service. When we do close at four o'clock each day, we get our -- we answer all our phones all day. Of course, you know, we pick those phones up and we have person to person phone calls. But at four o'clock when we close down, we switch it to answering service until eight o'clock the next morning.

And then if there are some very important things to deal or emergencies that go to the

F. DIRECTOR'S REPORT/UCHA ACHIEVEMENTS:

MR. SANGER: I do want to take a time now in my Director's -- Executive Director's Report just to give you a little general idea again of what we had done here at the Union City Housing Authority to address the needs of the Coronavirus.

As you know it was extremely complex, involving so many people, so many agencies. And — and, of course, the fear factor that's involved with this and the precautions and the restrictions that had to take place. So it did take the cooperation of many people, many agencies, and just about everyone involved with the — you know, the — with the people of Union City. And as you know, what's going on throughout the State of New Jersey and, of course, nationally and worldwide.

But to give you an idea, we're very proud

of the fact that we took a very proactive approach to the Coronavirus. And soon as we had 2 had heard -- and soon as we realized the -- the 3 impact, the importance and what could possibly 4 5 happen with the Coronavirus, how -- how it can really, you know, impact people, we realized we 6 were -- of course we're in the business of 7 serving people and we had to be extremely proactive. 10 And what we had done, we put together for the Union City Housing Authority here, on March 11 16th, --12 13 As you can see there's right -- right in the middle of March when this first began. 14 On March 16^{th} we put out a notice for 15 Coronavirus precautions to everyone here at the 16 17 Housing Authority. 18 And I just want to read them to you. And the reason why I'm reading it to you -- these to 19 you -- may take a few minutes -- but I -- I want 20 21 you to --22 If anyone ever asks you a question, or it ever comes up in -- in your daily conversations 23

with people, you have a general idea and we are

able to give an intelligent response or an

24

informative response of what we did here at the Housing Authority.

So I want all of you to have a good idea.

None of this is going to be a shock to you or be a very big surprise to you. But what it is is a comprehensive restrictions that we implemented here at the Housing Authority. And we're proud of the fact that we were able to get this done almost immediately.

So what we spoke about at the administrative office was to -- to clean and sanitize all our buildings daily, which we did.

We had different companies coming in -cleaning companies or whatever that were cleaning
our buildings here. Especially at 3700 Palisade
Avenue with 101 units for our senior citizens.
And all our buildings and properties throughout
Union City.

No outside persons were allowed in the inner office.

Lobby and window areas will be -- were cleaned and sanitized multiple times daily, both in the front back areas.

We sanitized all telephones, computers regularly with disinfectant.

1 All staff keeping bathrooms sanitary.

No unit apartment inspections were allowed.

We -- we cut -- we discontinued inspectors going
out and, of course, doing inspections in the

5 homes for obvious reasons.

And inspectors were still involved in doing all the records and necessary correspondence.

But also -- and, of course, to enforce our

9 | wellness items in our various places.

We suspended all activities in our Pavilion until further notice. No daycare; no gym activities. A lot of the things that you've been supporting.

We cancelled our Board meeting in March but we did have our telephonic meeting and we did not skip a beat at the Housing Authority with our operations.

And in our seniors building, which we feel is most important, -- because as you know the virus does have a, you know, a -- it's -- it's impact on the elderly. And we do know that 80 percent of the people who had -- with the virus have deaths who are -- with people 65 years of age or older. So, of course, we had to have a concentration there.

So, therefore, we closed the community room
there. We closed the TV room. We closed the
ceramic room. We consistently sanitized all
areas. We encouraged seniors to stay in
apartments as much as possible. Encouraged them
to be aware of their social interactions. We had
our social worker very close -- work closely with
them.

We worked with the Union City Board of
Health and the City of Union City that every one
of our senior citizens at 3700 that they were
swabbed and all of them were tested for the
virus.

So we're very happy with that as well.

Then also, we -- in order to protect the health and safety of the Housing Authority residents and -- and our staff, we -- we discontinued random visits to the administrative office. We gave to all the residents important numbers -- telephone numbers and email numbers to contact with us.

Work orders were limited to emergency and

-- so no one had to go into apartments. Only

items that were emergency such as maybe, you

know, broken pipes and, of course, any type of

1 sewage or anything like that.

Only emergency and necessity items were handled in the office and we -- we encouraged everyone to use our drop box. We have our drop box outside our office where they giving us all our papers, our leases, all important documents that they had to fill out and return to us, as well as all their monthly payments.

So the drop box was used for payments for public housing and Section 8 at our windows during the pandemic.

And we also rotated our staff. The first two weeks we had an A group and a B group.

Rotated our staff so we would not have the same

25 people or so in our office very day. We did

-- we rotated the staff so two days a week an A group was coming in; two days a week a B group

was coming in.

We're still getting -- what we were doing is trying to create a balance to be fair to everyone with the Corona-- to take care of all the steps to prevent any type of contact for Coronavirus, as well as keep the operations going. Because HUD -- HUD wanted to be sure that we were still under operations and we could take

care of all our obligations and responsibilities to the federal government. So we rotated that.

And I can say to you, something you should be -- we could all be proud of is the cooperation we got from all the residents was amazing. We didn't have one problem with residents as far as people concerned about, you know, work orders and payments and not being able to come to the office or any problems. Basically, everyone cooperate -- cooperated and knew the importance of the situation we were in.

And -- and also our staff here. Our staff here has been great, flexible, understanding, cooperative. We are -- you know, after that, about ten days right in the middle when things got really bad, we weren't in for a week or so.

I had discussed this with a -- with a few people and thought it best and I followed some of the lead of those -- some of the other agencies in Union City.

So for a week or so, right in the middle when the numbers really got high, we weren't in at all for a while. But then we did come back and we're still doing our rotation of two days a week. So the -- the Union City Housing Authority

is covered four days a week with what I like to call a skeleton crew or staggered crew.

So the most people that are here at any one time could be about nine people. And they're spread out all over the office, of course, keeping social distance and whatever.

So what I'm trying to say and -- everything that we did so far has turned out to be, you know, something that's been productive and very helpful.

And I -- both Jorge Rodriguez and I were on a teleconference call with HUD today and New Jersey NAHRO, which is a New Jersey Association for, you know, for Housing. And they suggested many things that people -- housing authorities should be doing during this virus. And I can say that every one that they had suggested today we had implemented over six, seven weeks ago.

So I'm very -- you know, very happy with that. So that's a great thing.

I just want to alert you to a few other things that are happening around town, too, to show that we are still moving forward -- the Housing Authority and we're not paralyzed by the pandemic.

519-521 Summit Avenue, known as our SDA We have that building -- we have about building. two more apartments to fill there. But we have the ten apartments that are full and that's doing very, very well. We just had some issues there we have to correct with some air conditioning with the air conditioning season coming and things of that nature.

But that's running along very well.

Cantello Street, with our COAH project going on there. We're starting next week with all -- in spite of the virus but with the Governor's approval that you could have construction, you know, going on now. And, of course, construction for essentials.

And we will be starting next week by making all the improvements. Demolition of the walkways and new walkways put in. New canopies outside and new lighting.

So we will be doing all the exterior work these coming weeks, maybe the next four, five weeks or so. Hopefully, after that, maybe we might — there might be a little, you know, improvement with the Coronavirus and to allow now where we could possibly go in to our apartments

Which is -- you know, does not really truly come
from the budget of the -- the Housing Authority.

And I just want to remind you that we did get \$324,000.00 from the Corona Relief Fund. And that \$324,000.00 we're going to be putting towards rent relief -- relief, as well as cleaning, disinfecting our buildings, stripping floors, waxing floors.

Maybe putting in some new items in different apartments and what we can do to help —— maybe some additional cameras and security around our sites because they want to improve during the Corona that they improve the safety and people not going into buildings who shouldn't be there. They're allowing for cameras and paying for extra security people and things of that nature.

So this might be helpful with us in getting additional cameras that won't cost us any money that we could charge to the Relief Fund.

So all in all, we do have a plan. Our plan
