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1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Welcome,
2	everyone, to the October 20th, 2022, meeting of the
3	Union City Housing Authority, and I just want to
4	welcome a few of our of course, all our Board
5	this evening, and there are a few people here from
6	the public to welcome to our meeting and hoping
7	everyone had you know, relax and enjoying the
8	fall season. We just mentioning what nice weather,
9	it certainly is, and, you know, it keeps you going,
10	you know? This nice chill keeps you nice. Nice
11	change. Nice change.
12	So with that we're just going to take
13	roll call for this evening's meeting.

5	quorum, and let me say that this is a regular
6	meeting of the Union City Housing Authority in
7	accordance and pursuant with Chapter 231 P.L. 1975,
8	the Open Public Meeting Act. Adequate notice of
9	this meeting has been provided as follows: An
10	annual schedule of Board meetings setting forth the
11	date, time, date, and location of such meetings, and
12	the notice and agenda to the extent known has been
13	prominently posted on the bulletin board and the
14	Housing Authority website.
15	So with that being said, we would like
16	to go right into our closed session of today's
17	meeting and where we do have some, what we will say,
18	important Board business, confidential, and what
19	goes along with that, and I would like at this
20	time we'd love to have someone give a motion to
21	go into closed session?
22	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Motion.
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Motion by
24	Ms. Gutierrez.
25	COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: Motion.

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Motion,
2	and, okay, and second by Debbie Mundorf.
3	All right. So roll call.
4	Mr. Pedraza?
5	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: Yes.
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Ms.
7	Gutierrez?
8	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Yes.
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Capizzi?

15	We are going into closed session. I
16	will ask the two members of the Board two members

18	Ms. Olivera, she's here, if she would like to go

20	(Commissioner Geldziler enters the
21	proceedings at this time.)
22	(Closed session held at 4:38 p.m. and ended
23	at 4:53 p.m.)
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Welcoming
2.5	the public back into our open session meeting and at

1	this time we'd like to go right into our open
2	session and start with resolutions that are always
3	vital to the Union City Housing Authority, and
4	allows us to move forward with all our operations
5	and our business and allows us to continue to
6	provide quality of life for the tenants within our
7	Housing Authority.

So our first resolution is Resolution 2022, No. 40.

And its a resolution approving the Union City Housing Authority awarding contract to Northeastern Interiors Corporation for exterior, which is -- oh, I'm just realizing that's an oxymoron, Northeastern Interiors for exterior upgrades to 122 Cantello Street, and

Whereas, the Union City Housing

Authority is a member Hunterdon County Services

Commissioner Cooperative Purchasing Program in the

State of New Jersey approved facilitator of service

provider for its members; and

Whereas, the Authority sought a state-approved provider for the removal of existing aluminum siding and installation of new vinyl siding, among other exterior upgrades, at 122 Cantello Street;

Whereas, the Authority received an estimate from Northeastern Interiors for the requested services in totals of \$129,863;

Whereas, in reviewing the estimate submitted it was determined to be legally sufficient and is recommending entry into a contract with Northeastern Interiors Corp. as specifically set forth in its estimate that would be subject to a written contract; and

Whereas, the contractor shall be paid in accordance with the rates set forth in the estimate submitted to the Authority;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Commissioners of the Union City Housing Authority do hereby approve entry into authorizing execution of entry into a contract with the Northeastern Interior Corp. for its services related to the removal of existing aluminum siding and installation of new vinyl siding along with other exterior upgrades at 122 Cantello Street as fully detailed in this estimate.

Be it further resolved that the Executive Director of the Union City Housing Authority is hereby authorized to execute all documents in connection with the contract with

Northeastern Interiors Corp. for services related to
the removal of the existing aluminum siding and
installation of new vinyl siding along with other
exterior upgrades at 122 Cantello Street as more
fully detailed in this estimate.

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER:	Moving on
2	now Resolution 2022, No. 41.	

Resolution approving the Union City
Housing Authority to publish request for proposal
for services related to security and parking lot
upgrades at 3700 Palisades Avenue, which is our
senior citizen building at Palisade Avenue where
there are 101 units.

Whereas, the Union City Housing
Authority is seeking approval of the Union City
Housing Authority Board of Commissioners to publish
a request for proposal seeking services for the new
installation of new parking lot surface, new
security gate, and safety lighting at 3700 Palisades
Avenue;

Whereas, the Authority has prepared a bid package in accordance with applicable state law for security and parking lot upgrades inviting those qualified entities to provide the necessary services;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Commissioners of the Union City Housing Authority do hereby approve and permit the Authority to publish a bid for services related to the installation of security and parking lot upgrades at 3700 Palisades

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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Moving on to Resolution 2022, No. 42.

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Resolution approving the Union City
Housing Authority to publish request for proposal
for services of new fencing along exterior parking
lot of 3911 Kennedy Boulevard;

Whereas, the Union City Housing Authority is seeking approval by the Union City Board of Commissioners to publish a request for proposal seeking services for the installation of perimeter exterior fencing at 3911 John F. Kennedy Boulevard, and you would see just a little clarification for you. As you came into the parking lot, you may have parked your vehicle this evening. On the right-hand side is a long fence that goes back maybe 300 feet or so, all the way to the back of our property which separates us from the property next door, which is Bergen Crematorium there, and that fence there that we're looking to replace that fence, take care of that fence, and eventually also be in partnership with them taking care of our end now and be in partnership with them, where we might be able to have a 50/50, kind of, thing because it really separates both properties. So we're doing a little, of course, this evening taking care of our

1	side of the parking lot, so to speak, our side of
2	the fence, so to speak, and they're going to take
3	care of their side of the fence, and I've had some
4	preliminary discussions with the management there,
5	and we're looking to be cooperative to get that
6	done. So just a little clarification for that one
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1 EXECU?	IVE DIRECTOR SANGER: 2	2022, No.
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43, resolution approving Union City Housing
Authority to publish request for proposal for
upgrades to emergency pull station alarm system at
3700 Palisades Avenue;

And some of you might be asking yourselves right now what is an emergency pull station alarm system? All right. And I would ask the same question, but in our -- we're very fortunate in our facility and our building, our senior citizens on 3700, each one of the bathrooms have a pull cord and if it happens, if any of the seniors, in any way, whether their safety might be at risk, their health or safety at the time while they're in the bathroom, they're able to pull the cord there, which sends now an electronic message down to a board down by the security quard and the board lights up and they know someone in that apartment might be having some difficulties and needs assistance. So that's how that works. So we're looking to -- that system was always in place. It needs fixing. It needs an upgrading. And we want to -- of course, something as important now with the safety, health and safety of our seniors, we want to be sure that that's working properly to

1	protect all involved. So we are requesting a
2	proposal for seeking services for the upgrade of
3	that pull system.
4	And whereas, the Authority has prepared
5	a bid package in accordance with applicable state
6	law for emergency pull station alarm system at 3700
7	Palisades Avenue inviting those qualified entities
8	to provide the necessary services.
9	Now, therefore, be it resolved the
10	Commissioners of the Union City Housing Authority do
11	hereby approve and permit the Authority to publish a
12	bid related to the upgrade of the emergency pull
13	station alarm system at 3700 Palisades Avenue.
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1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Next
2	Regulation 2022, No. 44.
3	Resolution approving the Union City
4	Housing Authority to publish request for proposal
5	for services for exterior improvements and
6	replacements at AMP II. Some of you might be asking
7	what is AMP II? AMP II is our three buildings that
8	are down on 39th Street, which will be 634, 640, 660
9	39th Street, and those are the three buildings
10	within our Housing Authority properties that are in
11	the greatest need of some improvement and things of
12	that nature.
13	So we're looking to make some
14	improvements there.
15	And whereas, the Housing Authority is
16	seeking approval by the Union City Housing Authority
17	Board of Commissioners to request proposal through
18	for seeking services for replacement and
19	installation of the entranceway, the floors in the
20	entranceway, the stairways, exterior lighting, and
21	the railings there. So we're looking to do that at
22	those three buildings that are part of AMP II. All
23	right.
24	And wheres, the Authority has prepared
25	a bid package in accordance with the applicable

1	state law for the replacement and installation of
2	entrance stairs, floors, and exterior lighting and
3	railings, all safety issues, health and safety
4	issues, inviting these qualified entities to provide
5	the necessary services.
6	Now, therefore, be it resolved that the
7	Commissioners of the Union City Housing Authority do
8	hereby approve and permit the Authority to publish a

bid for the exterior improvements and replacements

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at AMP II as described above.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: We'll go on now to Resolution 2022, No. 45.

Resolution approving the Union City
Housing Authority to publish the request for
proposal for services related to improvements to
common areas at AMP II. All right. Right before we
were talking about the entranceways and railings and
stairs and steps which were mostly under the
umbrella of exterior, and this now we're looking to
make improvements in some of our common areas within
the building, and that would include asking how
they're seeking proposals for improvements and
upgrades in those common areas of AMP II, which is
634, 640, and 660 39th Street, including plastering,
painting, and stairwell upgrades. Just a nice
little, you know, upgrade on everything there, clean
up, clean up, paint up, fix up, kind of thing.

Whereas, the Authority has prepared a bid package in accordance with the applicable state law for AMP II improvements and upgrades inviting those qualified entities to provide the necessary services;

Now, therefore, be it resolved the Commissioners of the Union City Housing Authority do hereby approve and permit the Authority to publish a

bid for services related to the improvements to the common areas of AMP II as described above.

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So those are our five -- our six. Six resolutions. And I might say all of those improvements that we've just asked in resolution to you and presented to you in resolution, all of those, the cost of all of those improvements will go through what we call our capital fund, all right, which is money that comes to us from the Housing and Urban Development, which we get approximately each year about \$1.2 million in order to make improvements and that money goes in different directions, though, but when it does come down to the actual money for improvements, we do have somewhere always between 600 and \$700,000 a year to make improvements, and this year we chose to make improvements in those areas, which we feel are the priority. We prioritized and felt that was the way to go with those priorities, and so we are making a lot of improvement there.

I don't think there is anything else that I have as far as that, but what we can do now, can I get a motion to maybe have consent agenda for this.

VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Motion.

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Motion by
2	Ms. Guterriez.
3	COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: Second.
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Second by
5	Ms. Mundorf.
6	ATTORNEY PIZZILLO: And I would just
7	say that the consent agenda, you guys are voting on
8	all of the resolutions as well as the approval and
9	the payment of bills and the minutes from the last
10	meeting as well.
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Uh-huh.
12	ATTORNEY PIZZILLO: That would be your
13	agenda, that would be what you're voting on, so,
14	excuse me, sorry, Mr. Sanger.
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: No problem.
16	Your right a target, sir. Counselor is right
17	target. Thank you.
18	So with that, we'll ask for a roll
19	call.
20	Mr. Pedraza?
21	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: Yes.
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Ms.
23	Gutierrez?
24	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Yes.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Ms.

1	Capizzi?
2	COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Yes.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Ms.
4	Mundorf?
5	COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: Yes.
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Mr.
7	Geldziler?
8	COMMISSIONER GELDZILER: Yes.
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Okay. Five
10	yes. We are now thank you for that, for the
11	consent agenda and as counsel had mentioned, that
12	covered all the areas there, and, of course,
13	including minutes of our last meeting, and it was
14	September 15th of last month.
15	With that being said, I would like at
16	this time to just present to the Board, if you
17	would, I wasn't able to get these in your original
18	packets that I had sent you Tuesday, but I was able
19	to get you some pictures of some of very important
20	project we've been talking to you about for last two
21	years.
22	I come to this meeting and I present to
23	you and you come to this meeting and I present to
2 4	you about our COAH. We were able to upgrade, fix up
2.5	and upgrade 40 units at what we called our veterans!

housing, which we like to now try to call affordable housing in Union City, no longer veterans' housing, but affordable housing, our affordable housing in Union City, and we were able to upgrade 40 of those units, and through your support, your diligence, and, of course, the cooperation with the Mayor of Union City and the city fathers, who helped provide for us with that COAH money, we were able to utilize \$1.3 million and we were able to upgrade those 40 units with new bathrooms, new kitchens, new windows, new electric, new stairwells, new doors, and just about -- just about everything, and we are on some of the final stages of that. I wanted you to see that. And what's exciting, these are the kind of things you're going to start seeing now. The inside of the building, it wasn't visible, you know, so a lot was going on there the last year and a half or so, but it wasn't visible because it was all interior work. Now, the exterior work is being completed. We're presently, as we speak, and you'll see some before and after pictures. As you could see, this building, these buildings here are 70 years old. Some of this vinyl siding and some of this covering here, I could say with confidence that maybe has not been improved upon in 50 years or so.

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1	And we were able to do that just recently. And
2	you'll see that I gave you a picture of some things
3	before, some of our older buildings and the vinyl
4	siding, and then also what's been complete thus, as
5	you could see that, we're ripping the siding off,
6	putting new insulation as well as the vinyl siding,
7	and if you wouldn't mind then, Ms. Mundorf, if you
8	could show everyone, there's a sample of the siding,
9	that's the color and the siding that's going up
10	there.

11 COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Nice.

COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: Very nice.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: So with

white trim. I think this picture here is a true example, if you look at this picture.

VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Very nice.

picture here is a true example of, you know, a sampling of -- an illustration of how we're capping all the windows, which I was just there twice this week myself, doing a great job with the windows, putting in the windows, the capping, and which always caused leaks and things of that nature. So we're very happy with what's happening there, just to give you an idea.

1	This picture here also gives you a
2	little broad view, you know, broad view of what's
3	happening at the side of the building. You come up
4	now from the Lincoln Tunnel, you look at those
5	buildings, you're going to start seeing bright,
6	clean, you know, upgraded bright lights. We're also
7	going to have 18 we're having 18 spotlights put
8	there. We're having eight of the decorative
9	lighting that the Mayor is also putting up the block
10	and the new street up the block off of, what is
11	that, Hudson Avenue there, between Hudson and
12	Palisades Avenue. So not only is he's taking those
13	decorative lighting that he's putting in the
14	streets, and you know how well that how nice that
15	looks in Union City, that's going to come into our
16	walkway area within this within this complex as
17	well. So that's going to brighten it up. Between
18	the spotlights and the decorative lighting, it's
19	going to be lit up like a Christmas tree there,
20	really, but it's great for people's health, for
21	their safety.
22	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Exactly.
23	COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: Safety.
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Yeah,
25	Safety issues and night safety and things of that

nature. So I just wanted to give you an idea of where we're at so far.

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Next month I will have for you, presented to you it complete. We expect this done within the next ten to 14 days and at our next meeting I'll show where you it's complete.

We're also looking to see, you might look and say, well, look this -- along here all this concrete that's along here, this is all going to be painted with exterior paint, quality paint, and a nice color brown so it all blends in, and also that paint also protects things. We're also -- where we have railings in the front those railings will all be painted, the stairwells that have been chipped and maybe the slate on the at stairwells, that's all going to fixed as well, and with the new lighting, and so we are excited that this, you know, this project is starting to come at that an end. will say this vinyl siding so you know, and this is one thing you voted upon tonight, \$129,000 for that Northeastern, all right, for that here is this is the only piece of the project that was not covered by COAH money. We paid for this ourselves. I want to be completely transparent on that. The exterior, all the exterior now, which is the exterior of the

siding, of the window trim, and this is all going to have gutters and leaders, spotlights, and really look sharp. All that was paid for by Union City Housing Authority money. The revenue that we've generated over the years in our veterans' account for our affordable accounting account. So we're taking money, the revenue right back and that revenue, and giving it right back to the people for improvements for them. And that's something that you've voted upon and you voted upon tonight as well, and, you know, with this. So I just wanted to give you a good idea of what's happening there with that. We're excited about that, and the Mayor's going to be opening up the street there, how we're working with the community. There's a brand new street one block up, and --

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VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Uh-huh.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: -- you know, it's really going to blend in nicely with that. This will also -- with this, we're going to be getting new fencing around our property, both on the -- let me say, the Peter Street side as well as the Cantello Street side. There will be all new fencing so people are not able to just go into that proper property so easily, because I do want to say,

Ι	and I have to be honest, here again, it's not
2	something we're proud of, but you have people from
3	these two big buildings there, the Thread and the
4	other building next door, I don't think it has a
5	name, these are beautiful 75 unit modern housing and
6	whatever, real nice, but unfortunately people, they
7	need their places to take their dogs for a walk, and
8	unfortunately they come on our property, okay? I
9	was just there the other day and I asked two young
10	ladies please don't have your dogs, right on our
11	property, right in the grass, thinking we cut in the
12	summer, whatever. So but we're going to be putting
13	up some real good fencing and everything to try to
14	alleviate that and all that. Yes, sir.
15	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: They are going to
16	have a dog park over there, in the street, Peter
17	Street.
18	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: On Peter
19	Street, yeah, they're going to have a new park.
20	COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: That's nice.
21	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Okay. I
22	didn't even know that.
23	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: For small
24	and medium dogs.

CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: Yeah.

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: So good,
2	maybe some of the people could take the dogs over
3	there rather than use our property really.
4	COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Seriously.
5	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Exactly.
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: You have to
7	see. It's just it could be frustrating. So all
8	this, all this is, you know, leading us to, you
9	know, just providing nice. And then we're hoping,
10	and I know as Ms. Beshara is here this evening,
11	we're hoping then right after this holiday and
12	whatever, we could start discussing what we're going
13	to be doing now for Phase 2 and discuss with the
14	city fathers, discuss with city attorneys, see what
15	funding is in COAH now, what money they've been able
16	to gather, accumulate, revenue coming in, that will
17	now and see how much money we could possibly
18	start now working towards the second phase, which is
19	the other 62 of these units that are around town,
20	uptown 39th, 43rd, 44th Street, and then downtown on
21	5th and 6th Street. So we're looking to do that.
22	So, you know, something that hasn't been addressed
23	in many, many years, and with the working in
24	partnership with the city with their COAH funding,
25	and which is, you know, the Coalition of Affordable

1	Housing, and that money should go back to people for
2	affordable housing and it did in this case. Every
3	dime of it went back to, you know, for the people.
4	The lower income people in affordable housing, so
5	that is my report.
6	And at this time it is public portion
7	of the meeting.
8	Is there anyone, members of the public,
9	who would like to come forward and address the
10	Board?
11	COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: She might need a
12	translator.
13	(Foreign language spoken at this time.)
14	COURT STENOGRAPHER: I'm sorry.
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Maybe, Mr.
16	Pedraza, you could have her stand by you? Lourdes?
17	(Foreign language spoken at this time.)
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Thank you,
19	Lourdes, Lourdes Olivera. Lourdes, is from 5th
20	Street, downtown. Maybe you could help and
21	translate for us. Thank you.
22	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: (Translating for
23	Ms.Olivera). I live in 405 5th Street, Apartment
24	2.
25	Four weeks ago she got Covid, or I got

1	Covid, I'm sorry. I can't now sleep because of my
2	neighbor didn't allow me to sleep.
3	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: For four
4	weeks.
5	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: For four weeks.
6	Four weeks.
7	So the neighbor have to leave the
8	apartment. The neighbor is 407, Apartment 2,
9	Xxxxxxx Xxxxxxx.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: We'd rather
11	not mention the names. I'm very well aware of this
12	I'm very well aware of this.
13	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: So he broke the
14	apartment, the toilet, the water is going down.
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: I could
16	if you don't mind, senora, tell her thank you for
17	coming. Thank you for sharing that with us.
18	What is she saying? I could an
19	imagine.
20	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: Okay.
21	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Which is
22	fine. She's right, by the way. But yes.
23	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: No, no, she said
24	that she's not able to sleep for three weeks, for
25	three days, also somebody wants to move her to

1 Cantello.

2 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Yes.

3 See, here is the situation, and,

4 senora, if it's okay, I want to explain to the

5 Board.

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Ms. Olivera, and I want her to know,

what she is presenting to you is 100 percent

accurate and true and we want to support you. No

Unfortunately, we've had Ms. Olivera sitting -- living next to, in our housing, our veterans' housing downtown, you see how close they are in proximity, they're close together, and unfortunately you can truly hear someone from the next apartment, what's going on, et cetera. Right next door to her at 407, she lives 405, 407 are two gentlemen who are brothers. One is 62 years old, one is 52, and I'd rather not mention their names, okay? But the younger one of them is a man who has some serious mental health issues, all right? And unfortunately in the evenings and during the day and at the various times, he can be explosive, all right? He can start banging on walls, which is very disruptive, and she can't sleep and, et cetera, he can be yelling out different things, losing control

of himself. So his mental health condition is causing him to act out and be a disruption and disturbance to the people in the units around him, all right? We've been very well aware of this. I have called the older sister of these two gentlemen, and I have inside reports from a local clinic, mental health clinic in Jersey City that works with the gentleman who has these outbursts. We're looking to see now what could possibly -- how possibly we could possibly get a relocation for him because the fact is that right now him, himself and his brother, they are not capable of living on their own anymore. They're too much of a disruption. So I'm trying to work with some of the mental health people and some of the agencies in Jersey City and around. I have some reports inside. I was on the phone last week. I'm waiting for some more to come through to us to see if it's possible if there could be a relocation of him somewhere that he can get the assistance he needs and the supervision he needs because of his condition. That can be very hard to do, okay? But the most imminent or the most -- what could be a solution for this is Ms. Olivera, Ms. Olivera, you live on the second floor? Okay. What I'd like to do, right done on 5th Street, and she

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lives between Bergenline Avenue and New York Avenue on 5th Street. Right down closer, when you go down 5th Street closer to Edison School, there are our affordable housing units there across from Edison School. We just had a person move out from there, that's being moved out, all right, that went through a process with our attorney and whatever, okay? This person went back to the Dominican Republic, all right? That now apartment is what we call a turnover now. We literally today took all the furniture out of it. The person just went back to the Dominican Republic, left us with everything. So now after waiting a certain amount of days and et cetera, we take that old furniture and whatever, we put on the sidewalk. It goes in whatever -- if there's some things we can to Salvation Army or something like that, we try, but whatever. So bottom line is we will have a new apartment, another apartment upstairs on the second floor about a block and a half down, and I would -- once that turnover happens and we fix it up, when we go in a turnover we fix the floors, we clean it up, we paint it. We do the best we can to get it in livable condition, all right, for people, and what I like to do and I work with Vito Tattolli, who is not here tonight,

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both Vito and Jorge had really important family matters, and it's rare that this happens, but they're not with us, but I asked Vito to go down and speak to Ms. Olivera, he speaks -- Vito speaks Spanish, you know, Spanish very well, and could communicate with her, and make her an offer to see if she would like to go down to that apartment.

CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: Okay.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: That I could have available from, you know, right around the holidays. Month or so.

Would she be willing -- maybe you could ask, Margarita or Mr. Pedraza or whoever, maybe you could ask: Would she be willing to consider being relocated to get away from this gentleman, because yes, we want to move this gentleman out, but it may take some time, it may take some time, but in the meantime I want to do the best to accommodate and help her and make her an offer that I could bring her within a month or by -- I should basically say by December 1st. I need a little time. By December 1st I could have her into a new apartment, and we'll help move her, too. She's an older person. I know she might be limited. I'll help move her, my staff, my group, I'll pay for a mover, I'll do certain

1	things, we do things to accommodate her. I
2	realize she's a hundred percent right, that's not
3	fair to her, and we want to try to help and do what
4	we can.
5	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Second
6	floor?
7	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Second
8	floor. It's a nice, quiet area. The people
9	there tell her the people there are the kind of
10	people there are people who have lived together
11	for quite a while, they look out for each other,
12	it's a nice, little section there that's very quiet,
13	it's across the street from the school, but it's in
14	the back, not in the front. It's in the back from
15	the school. It's not it's in the back from the
16	school, and the people there really look out for
17	each other. The people there really do.
18	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: No, she
19	said so don't want the one in the back. She doesn't
20	want to live like that because she said she like to
21	see people walking around in the front.
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Well, what
23	I could say to her, her dilemma, her situation is
24	accurate, and it's true, I just need some time. I

need some time. Right here I have letters from the

1	doctor. I have a letter from the community, the
2	community health providers in Jersey City. We're
3	working on this. I'm following up with a doctor who
4	I've talked to a few times.
5	So the bottom line is give me sometime.
6	I'll try to find her a place that, I guess, she
7	wants to see action or see people or something.
8	It's in the back, but it's a quiet area, really.
9	COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Why don't ask
10	her if she wants to look at it.
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: After I fix
12	it up, sure.
13	COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: No, just to show
14	her where it is.
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: I can have
16	Vito do it, yes, yes. Yes. That's a good idea.
17	Would she like to go nice suggestion by Ms.
18	Capizzi. Ms. Capizzi, go right ahead.
19	COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Maybe if she
20	just we can have someone here just show her where
21	it is, not that she has to take it, but just show
22	her, walk her there.
23	(Foreign language spoken at this time.)
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: It might
25	change her mind.

1	COMMISSIONER CAPIZZI: Just look at it.
2	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Vito might
3	have showed her already.
4	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: Is it on
5	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: It's in
6	front of the Harrison.
7	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: West
8	Street.
9	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: West Street.
10	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: She knows
11	where it is. She said her son is handicapped, you
12	know.
13	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Okay.
14	Okay. Tell her tell her that we're we are
15	addressing this. Don't think we're not taking this
16	seriously. We are. We're addressing this as best
17	we can. Looking for looking for an alternative
18	site for her, as well as as well as working with
19	the medical staff of the other guy, too. It's hard.
20	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: She's been
21	living there for 20 years and it wasn't like that
22	before. He talk to her and everything, and
23	something happened in there that she doesn't know,
24	and it was okay, but now it's really out of control.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Yes, and we

1	are aware of this, and we'll keep we are working
2	as with his family to try to relocate.
3	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: He pulled
4	something to burn in there. They are all getting
5	fire in there, because, you know, the way he is.
6	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: She doesn't want
7	it.
8	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: She
9	doesn't want to see the apartment. She knows where
10	the apartment is.
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Okay.
12	Okay. Tell her it's going to take some time to try
13	to find an alternative.
14	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Right
15	before the pandemic everything is getting longer, I
16	mean, you know, the process.
17	ATTORNEY PIZZILLO: Yeah, there's a
18	long process that we have to follow to legally move
19	him out, and
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Very
21	difficult situation.
22	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: She said
23	that she had the Covid, that she wasn't getting
24	sleep.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: We've been

1	in touch with her a lot, too. We've been talking to
2	her a lot.
3	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: She said
4	the brother, he throw things.
5	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: The
6	brother, I know, the brother, yes, yes.
7	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Yes.
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Yes. I
9	have letters here. These are letters I've received
10	about from the medical, I don't want to go
11	through it, of course, but these are letters that
12	I've received from the medical. These are all the
13	notes, my follow-up notes, speaking to so many as
14	many people as I can to try to work on this
15	situation. So we've also been in contact with the
16	family, his family now, his, you know, his family
17	and see how they can assist us in trying to relocate
18	him and get it done. Diane. Okay. Thank you,
19	senora. Thank you, senora.
20	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Why they
21	don't give no medicine to him? He have to be
22	medicated.
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: He's been
24	medicated.
25	ATTORNEY PIZZILLO: He is under medical

1	care. He has mental health professionals, but
2	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER:
3	Unfortunately, we haven't had the
4	results
5	ATTORNEY PIZZILLO: Yeah, right.
6	COMMISSIONER MUNDORF: Tough stuff.
7	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Well, they
8	give him medication, he quiet down for two or three
9	days, but look like now they don't give anything to
10	him.
11	ATTORNEY PIZZILLO: I know, and
12	unfortunately, we can't control that.
13	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Yeah. She
14	said the brother is abusing, they don't take of the
15	brother because she's 90 years old, you know.
16	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: We're going
17	to be working with all agencies and everything as
18	much as possible, and in the meantime, I'm going to
19	try to find a place for her, an alternate place,
20	too, to help her, because she deserves she
21	doesn't deserve this. That's for sure.
22	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Thank you.
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Thank you.
24	That's a hard situation.
25	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: The get

1	into her.
2	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: If you
3	don't mind. Mr. Pedraza?
4	CHAIRPERSON PEDRAZA: It's a hard
5	situation.
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Yes, it's a
7	hard situation, but as I'm saying without getting
8	into names and things of that nature
9	ATTORNEY PIZZILLO: HIPAA.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: You know,
11	they have medical rules that protect people, but
12	we've addressed this. I've been on the phone. I've
13	been in communication with the mental health people,
14	the assistants and the professionals that have been
15	assigned working with him trying to get someone to
16	help, they've written me back some letters and I'm
17	not happy with the letter, to be honest with you,
18	and I'm looking to get in touch with the head doctor
19	of the facility. I have the doctor's name and
20	number here, who I called twice, I've had notes, and
21	trying to get to see what we can do to, you know.
22	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Resolve
23	the matter.
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Get more of
25	a movement to relocate the gentleman and if not,

1	relocate her.
2	So, as things open up, as you know,
3	these apartments, the few open up far, and sometimes
4	we have one opening a year, you know.
5	VICE-CHAIRPERSON GUTIERREZ: Yeah,
6	that's true.
7	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: A year or
8	something, and we'll see where we can do.
9	So we are addressing this, that's what
10	I could tell.
11	Ms. Beshara, anything you'd like to
12	share with us?
13	MS. BESHARA: Yeah. Yes.
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Yes, ma'am.
15	MS. BESHARA: Toni Beshara.
16	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Thank you
17	or your patience.
18	MS. BESHARA: Toni Beshara, veterans'
19	apartments on 44th Street.
20	I am okay. Vito's not here, but
21	maybe you know. The contractors that renovated for
22	handicapped, the bathroom of the tenant downstairs
23	from me, will that contractor be used for any of
24	this well, is he like a regular or she?
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: No, this is

1	not the let's say the contractor who worked by
2	you is completely different than the contractor that
3	worked with the other units.
4	MS. BESHARA: Okay. Because I'm
5	right now that the bathroom, it's not been long ago,
6	it's not been renovated long ago, and there is a
7	waterfall in the basement when they take a full
8	shower. They've been trying to be nice and, you
9	know
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Is Vito
11	aware of this? I think he's aware of this, isn't
12	he?
13	MS. BESHARA: Yeah, but I asked him the
14	most recent time he came when it might be addressed
15	and he said something about a crystal ball that he
16	doesn't have.
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: What
18	address is that?
19	MS. BESHARA: 305 44th Street. And
20	it's the downstairs.
21	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: First
22	floor.
23	MS. BESHARA: Renovated bathroom.
2 4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Oh,
25	that's

1	MS. BESHARA: It was renovated for the
2	handicapped.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Yeah, yeah
4	I think we took care of that, though. We took
5	care I've been on the phone with M , with M ,
6	correct?
7	MS. BESHARA: Uh-huh.
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Yes. I've
9	been on the phone with M, I don't want to mention
10	the name, but I've been on the phone with M, Ms. M,
11	and we've discussed this and she's happy with the
12	progress that we're making.
13	MS. BESHARA: That's thirties not what
14	I heard, because I spoke with her this morning
15	telling her that I went down, because yesterday I
16	did a little laundry, and I noticed that there was
17	water all over the place. So this morning I went
18	down and sure enough the water was coming down
19	again.
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: I'll get
21	Vito
22	MS. BESHARA: Nobody came there.
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: there
24	tomorrow.
25	MS. BESHARA: Nobody went there. And

Τ	she said she took off two days, and
2	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: But I've
3	been in contact with Madeline and we did some other
4	things for her that I won't get into, dealt with one
5	or two other things, and we told her that we were
6	going to be taking care of next steps. We took care
7	of half of the things we have
8	MS. BESHARA: She told me to let you
9	know.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: I'm
11	surprised. She's been on the phone with me
12	regularly.
13	MS. BESHARA: Okay.
1 4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: I know
15	Madeline, we have a good relationship, regular. All
16	right. But I'll take care of that. I'll talk to
17	Madeline.
18	MS. BESHARA: The water comes out the
19	window, down the siding, into the basement.
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: I'll talk
21	to M tomorrow morning. I'll talk to her about it
22	tomorrow morning.
23	MS. BESHARA: Okay. I was just curious
2 4	more about the contractors, because that's alarming
25	to me.

1	With that said, have you had any
2	feedback from the residents who have had a while to
3	live with those renovations over on Cantello, both
4	good and bad, any what feedback?
5	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: I haven't
6	other than a punch list and a punch list of items
7	that weren't complete, such as maybe loose sockets,
8	maybe floor boards, loose sockets, kitchen cabinets
9	that have to be adjusted, and things of that nature,
10	other than the punch list and it's the final
11	those are the final items that must be completed
12	before a contractor is paid in full, I have not
13	heard of any no, nothing major, nothing has come
14	to me as anything major, no.
15	MS. BESHARA: So in general you're
16	saying
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: In general
18	people are happy, yes.
19	MS. BESHARA: Okay. Because I know a
20	few people and that's not what's coming back around.
21	I hear they're not happy.
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Well, they
23	haven't relayed that to me. They haven't relayed
24	that to me. I don't know.
25	MS. BESHARA: Okay.

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: If they
2	relay that to me, I'll be happy to talk with them.
3	MS. BESHARA: Okay. All right.
4	There will be more, you know, going
5	forward. I know that you took me through one. I
6	was alarmed at some of the quality of the materials.
7	I hadn't seen all the work, but I saw some of it,
8	but it alarmed.
9	What would be next in the timeline
10	given that November you're expecting to finish the
11	siding?
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: As I stated
13	before, we're hoping after the holidays and after
14	this second phase of the project, the siding is
15	complete. We can then get together with people, the
16	COAH officials, and who are oversee the COAH funding
17	for the City of Union City and see start making a
18	plan now what funds are available, and then start
19	working with architect and engineer to see how we
20	could address these issues.
21	MS. BESHARA: Okay. And do you have
22	any idea when you'll be going to court for that?
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: No.
24	MS. BESHARA: You still don't know?
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: No.

1	MS. BESHARA: Given how the first phase
2	went, when would you expect work to possibly begin
3	on any or all?
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: I don't
5	know. I don't know. Because we would have to go
6	through a procurement process, all right, and you
7	would have to go out to bid for contractors. It
8	doesn't necessarily mean it would be the same
9	contractor for this next phase, and it's a whole
10	process of procurement that you have to go through.
11	So it may take a little more time.
12	MS. BESHARA: Okay. Would you be
13	announcing, you know, when you'll be going to court
14	or no?
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: No, no.
16	That's something we don't do.
17	MS. BESHARA: We've done the court
18	thing.
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: No, that's
20	not something we don't do.
21	MS. BESHARA: All right. I just
22	basically want to
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: If you came
24	and called, and came and questioned, but it's not
25	something you make a general announcement about.

1	MS. BESHARA: NO, I Mean It's
2	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: That's an
3	administration issue. Those are administrative
4	processes.
5	MS. BESHARA: Well, you've been giving
6	us updates at the meetings. I was just wondering.
7	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Yeah, but I
8	could tell you on or about this month they're hoping
9	to go to court and do certain you know, I can't
10	be specific and be in detail with that.
11	MS. BESHARA: Okay. Got it.
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: But I will
13	say anyone who is not happy over there, they can
14	come here any time and speak with us, they could
15	come at any time and speak with me, because I know
16	this Board and what we have done and what we've had
17	addressed there. While it is not perfect, all
18	right, it is 100 percent better than it was, and
19	MS. BESHARA: I saw some of the
20	materials. Some of the materials I would take issue
21	with.
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Well,
23	that's in the eyes of the beholder
24	MS. BESHARA: They don't
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: That's in

1	the eyes of the beholder. And you and I we've
2	discussed this before.
3	MS. BESHARA: Well, yeah, but I know,
4	though, it's not just the eyes of the beholder.
5	You're talking, yeah, they're cast iron tubs,
6	they're old, I've touched them, I've touched the
7	sinks. I've
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: They're all
9	brand new there, the tubs and the sinks there.
10	MS. BESHARA: I saw them and I heard
11	and they sound like tin and the sink sounds like
12	something you'd give to a kid in a dollhouse. It's
13	not
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Well, I'll
15	just say to you that's a shock that you said that to
16	me.
17	MS. BESHARA: They won't last.
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: That's a
19	shock that you said that to me. A tin in a
20	dollhouse.
21	All I could say is if people are
22	not happy, if they could come, they could see us and
23	talk with us, and I'll be happy to talk with them.
24	That's all, okay?
25	MS. BESHARA: Okay. Well, this is

1	what's going around.
2	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Well, no, I
3	don't know. That may be that might be some, but
4	I don't know if that's the consensus.
5	MS. BESHARA: I don't know if all of
6	them. Maybe I mean, I'm sure there are some
7	items that had to be replaced, that really did, I'm
8	sure in some apartments, but
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: Almost
10	everything was replaced, ma'am.
11	MS. BESHARA: I do know that, but in
12	some some things really did have to be replaced.
13	Other things don't have to be replaced, but again,
14	I'm starting to
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: When some
16	things don't have to be replaced, ma'am, that's
17	people's that's only one person's, their personal
18	desire that they like something
19	MS. BESHARA: I disagree.
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: That the
21	personal desire
22	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
23	COURT STENOGRAPHER: Hang on. Just one
24	at a time.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SANGER: That's

            their personal desire that they feel that something

            in their apartment or the sink's not old, it's okay,
